

PRESENT PERFECT

- We use present perfect tense to talk about an action has just been completed or when we don't know exactly when the action happened.
- E.g. I have just cleaned the living room
- We have already watched the film.
- Ammar has arrived Mecca.

PRESENT PERFECT

Form:

- Subject + Have/has + V-p.p

I /they/ you/ we → have She/he / it → has

Have → 've has → 's

- Shahd 's Tided up her room. (tidy up)
- Hasan has arrived England. (arrive)

PAST PARTICIPLE

Regular verbs:

Tidy up → tidied up

Cook → cooked

Dust → dusted

Clean → cleaned

Empty → emptied

Irregular verbs:

Do → done

Put → put

Take → taken

Come → come

Go → gone

Go to P.66 and 67 in Activity book to read and memorize the irregular verbs.



Grammar

Present perfect with *already*, *just*, *never* and *yet*

I've He's They've	<i>already</i> <i>just</i> <i>never</i>	swept the floor. eaten lunch. made the cake. vacuumed the carpet.	
I haven't She hasn't		watered the plants	<i>yet.</i>
Have you Has anyone		emptied the bins taken out the rubbish	<i>yet?</i>

We sometimes use the Present perfect with *already*, *just*, *never* and *yet*.

We use *already* / *just* / *never* / *yet* when we have done something a short time ago.

We use *already* / *just* / *never* / *yet* when we have done something earlier than someone expected.

We use *already* / *just* / *never* / *yet* when we haven't done something at any time in our life.

We use *already* / *just* / *never* / *yet* in negative sentences and questions to talk or ask about something we haven't done, but we are going to do soon.

We use present perfect with **never** to talk about life experience;
we use it to say we have not done something at any time of our life.

e.g. I've **never** been to Japan.

We can use **already** at the end of sentence.

e.g. I've already swept the floor.

I've swept the floor **already**.

We use present perfect with **yet** in question and negative
sentences only

e.g. I haven't swept the floor **yet**.
Have you watered the plants **yet**?
