I learned car mechanics, which taught me some useful, practical skills. Thirdly, I organised a four-day camping and hiking trip in the Scottish mountains with other students from my school. I learned about using camping equipment and dealing with problems like bad weather and getting lost.

I believe I have lots of useful experience to work as an Overland Tour Guide. I would love the opportunity to tell you more about my skills at an interview.

Ashrita Furman is a record-breaker. He has set more records than anyone else has in the world. In the last 40 years, he has established more than 600 records. When he was a child, Ashrita loved reading the Guinness Book of World Records. He wanted to be in it too, so he thought people had to be good at sports to be in the book. He was not a good athlete. He felt his dream would never come true. However, later in life, Ashrita learned thinking carefully about his dream. Thus, he believed that nothing is impossible. He tested this idea in 1978 by entering a 24-hour bike race in New York. Without any training, Ashrita came third! After that, he started thinking about breaking records again.

First, he tried to break the record for the most jumping jacks. He failed at first, but, remembering that 'anything is possible', he trained, thought well and tried again. This time, he did 27,000 jumping jacks in 6 hours 45 minutes and became the new record holder. His achievement appeared in the 1980 Guinness Book of Records.

Today, Ashrita has a long list of records, including walking the furthest distance with a bike on his chin, cycling the longest distance with a bottle on his head and lighting the most candles on a birthday cake. He says: "I choose ideas which are challenging and childish! I enjoy practising and seeing my progress." He says his favourite record was "the longest distance on a pogo stick". While he was on holiday in Japan, he saw Mount Fuji and thought it was beautiful, so he decided to try to break a record there. He climbed it in 11.5 miles. The most difficult record was "the most forward rolls". In 10 hours and 30 minutes, he rolled his body in 8,341 forward circles for 12 miles.

If you want to break a world record too, Ashrita gives this advice. "Choose something you enjoy because you will need to practise and don't give up. Your mind will tell you that something is impossible, but it is not. If you see someone doing something difficult, try it and don't ignore it!"

Special events in country's history or the changing seasons are also celebrated. Singing and exchanging gifts are popular rituals and often form part of any annual festival.

Pictures and objects also have a special meaning at festival time. For example, golden fish becomes symbols of wealth at Chinese New Year.

Different cultures share the same symbols in their festivals. Christians light candles at Christmas and Hindus do the same for Diwali. People dressing up in costumes and sharing meals together are popular festive activities in many parts of the world.

Thanksgiving is celebrated in November. It's a national holiday where people get together to share the traditional dinner of turkey and pumpkin pie. Thanksgiving started in the autumn of 1621. A group of European settlers in North America invited the Indians to join them for their first harvest in a thanksgiving feast because the Indians had taught them how to grow crops.

Halloween is celebrated on the 31st of October, the night before All Saint's Day. Typical festive activities include trick-or-treating dressing up in costumes, carving jack-o'-lanterns, lighting bonfires, and apple bobbing. Lighting candles and putting them inside frightening pumpkin pie faces scare away evil spirits at Halloween.

Every year in July, people in Uban Ratchathani Thailand celebrate the candle festival. Tourists from all over the country come to Uban to look at huge wax candles that are paraded through the streets. There is music, dancers, a huge market and even a competition for artists to design the best candle.

Day of the Dead is celebrated on November 1st in Mexico, Ecuador, Guatemala and other parts of central and south America. Families gather to pray to dead relatives and ask them to return for just one night. So, they decorate their homes and gravesites with food, candles, candy skulls and flowers to welcome the dead back to earth. People dress up as skeletons and parade through the streets.

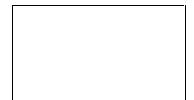

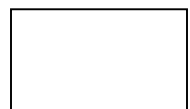

ARRIVING AT FINAL SCORES

LST/ RDG: In these two sections, all student responses are of the objectively-marked, right-or-wrong type. So, there should never be any discrepancies in the marks awarded.

Action required: With 'short answer' items, there may be (accidental) discrepancies in the scores awarded by the two markers. The Supervisor/Adjudicator should be on the lookout for any such discrepancies, and if they occur, should read the students' response and award the correct mark.

WRITING: In this section, student responses are independently marked by two markers using their judgement (based on the wording of the Rating Scale provided). As a result, differences may sometimes occur between the two scores awarded.

In such cases, there are two possible procedures:

- 1) Acceptable differences: If – as in most cases – the difference between the two scores is small, i.e. just **one level**, the Supervisor/Adjudicator is not required to read the student's response. He/She should simply use the mathematical average of the two scores. (*See below)
- 2) Unacceptable differences: However, if the difference between the two scores is substantial, i.e. **more than one level**, the Supervisor/Adjudicator should read the student's response and, after due consideration, decide on an appropriate mark.

ARRIVING AT FINAL SCORES

LST/ RDG: In these two sections, all student responses are of the objectively-marked, right-or-wrong type. So, there should never be any discrepancies in the marks awarded.

Actionrequired: With 'short answer' items, there may be (accidental) discrepancies in the scores awarded by the two markers. The Supervisor/Adjudicator should be on the lookout for any such discrepancies, and if they occur, should read the students' response and award the correct mark.

WRITING: In this section, student responses are independently marked by two markers using their judgement (based on the wording of the Rating Scale provided). As a result, differences may sometimes occur between the two scores awarded.

In such cases, there are two possible procedures:

- 1) **Acceptabledifferences:** If – as in most cases – the difference between the two scores is small, i.e. just **onelevel**, the Supervisor/Adjudicator is not required to read the student's response. He/She should simply use the mathematical average of the two scores. (* See below)
- 2) **Unacceptabledifferences:** However, if the difference between the two scores is substantial, i.e. **more than one level**, the Supervisor/Adjudicator should read the student's response and, after due consideration, decide on an appropriate mark.
